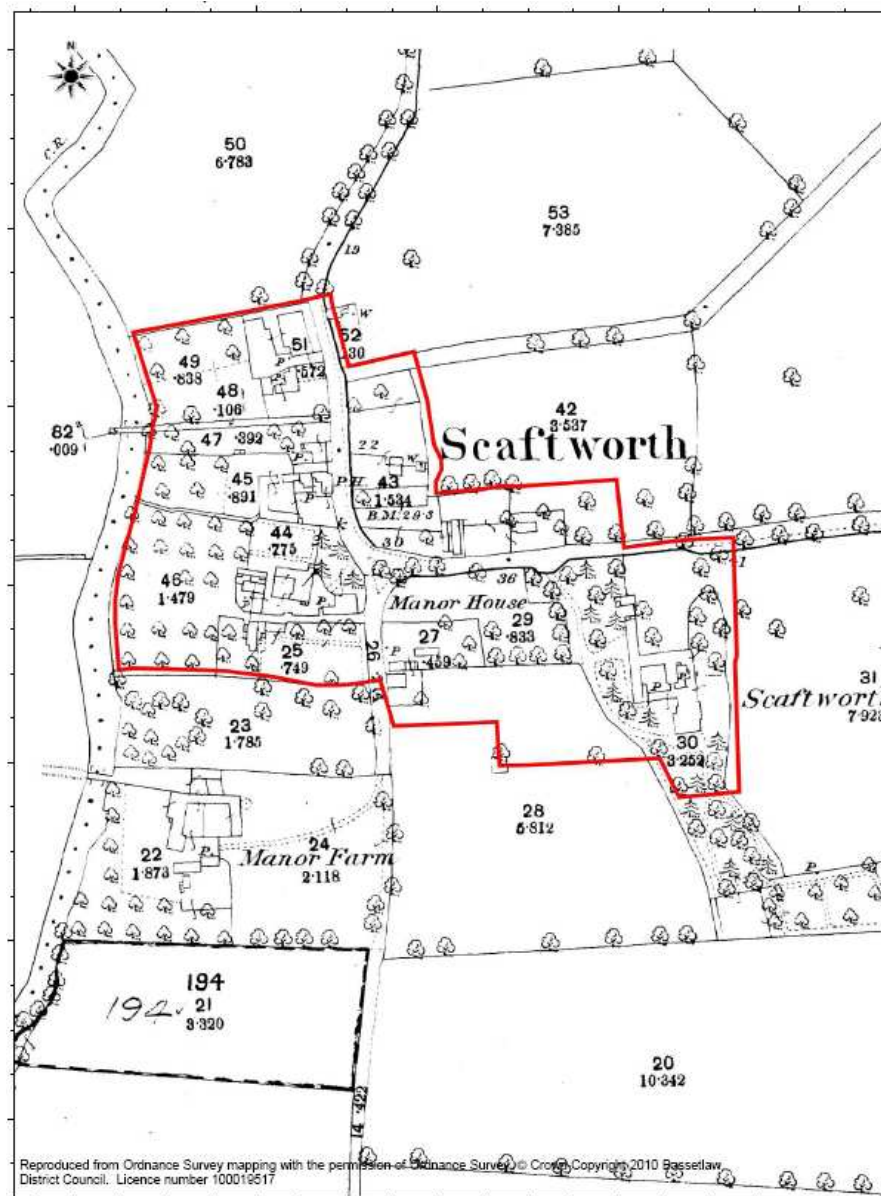
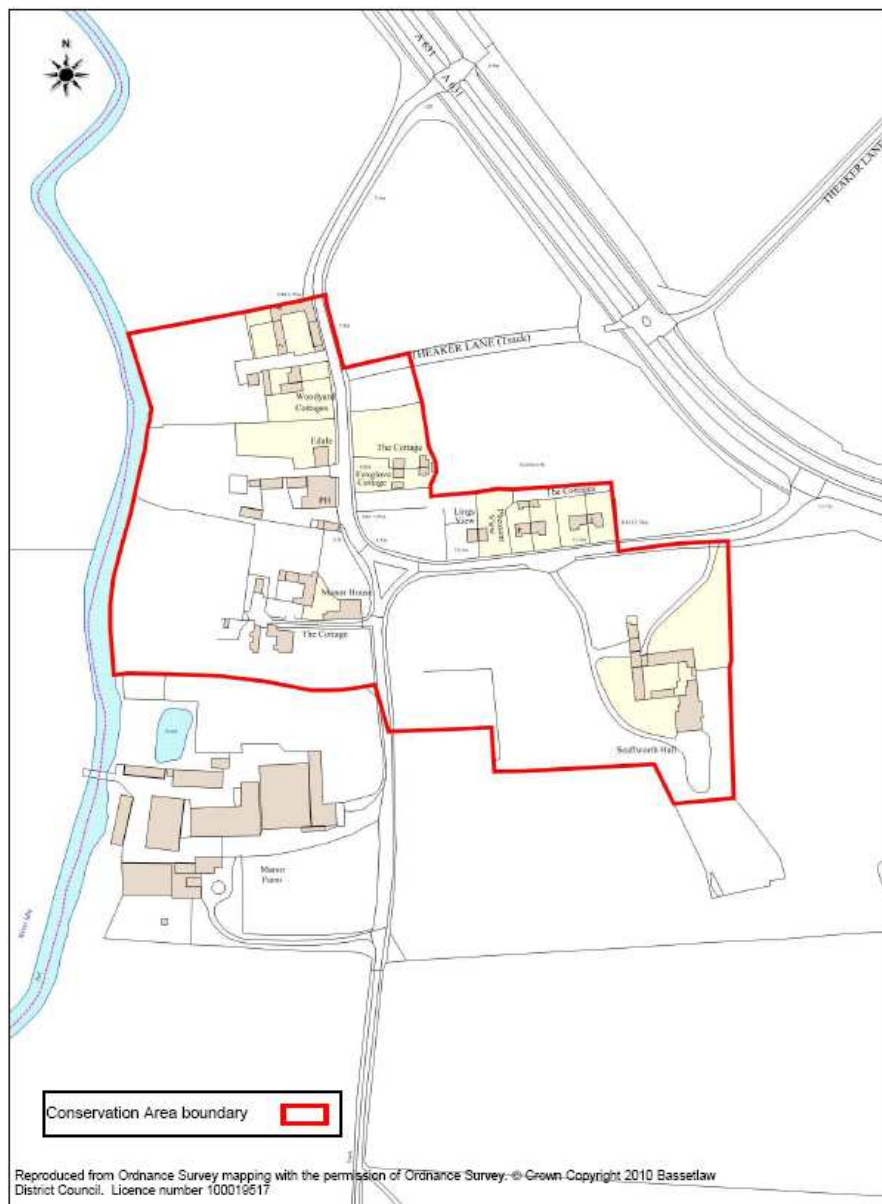

Scaftworth

Scaftworth is an extremely attractive estate village associated with Scaftworth Hall from the 18th century. In 1835, the manor comprised the whole township under the Viscount Althorp.



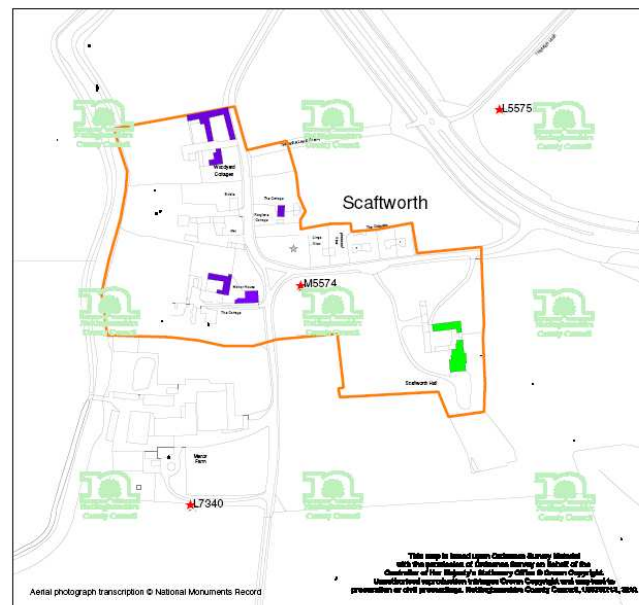
Scaftworth Hall, a Grade II listed building (source: BDC, 2010).

The early 20th century saw a further development phase, and many of the estate cottages date from this period. The Hall and associated barn are both Grade II listed, and most of the other buildings in the village are heritage assets of local interest.

The wider area contains a wealth of archaeology. Nearby, for example, is the outline of a rectangular Roman fort in the bend of the River Idle.
